The asteroid disappeared almost instantly.
The consequences had only begun.
Within minutes, shock waves raced around the globe.
Within hours, Earth had become almost unrecognizable.
What followed wasn't simply an explosion:
It was a planetary catastrophe unlike anything
humanity has ever witnessed.

THE TSUNAMI

Water became a moving mountain.

- Initial water displacement approached 2.8 miles (4.5 km) high immediately around the collapsing crater.
- Within minutes, enormous waves nearly one mile (1.5 km) high spread outward through the Gulf of Mexico.
- Along portions of the Gulf Coast, surges may have exceeded 650 feet (200 meters).
- Water swept more than 60 miles (100 kilometers) inland across low coastal plains.

*Entire coastlines disappeared
beneath the sea.*



THE SKY WENT DARK

Dust. Ash. Sulfur aerosols.
Vaporized rock. Together they
formed a dense global veil.
Sunlight diminished dramatically.
Photosynthesis nearly stopped.
Global temperatures plunged.

*Scientists estimate this impact winter
may have lasted months to several
years, depending on location and
atmospheric conditions.*



ENGINEERING PERSPECTIVE

The asteroid demonstrated one of
nature's most important engineering lessons.

*Complex systems often fail through
cascading effects rather than a single
catastrophic event.*

THE FIRESTORM

Trillions of tons of molten rock and
vaporized debris were blasted into
space. Hours later, gravity brought
much of that material back.

As millions of glowing fragments
reentered Earth's atmosphere,
they heated the sky like the inside
of a giant furnace.

Across much of North America—
and possibly other continents—
vegetation ignited.

Entire forests burned.

The atmosphere itself
may have glowed red.

0 SECONDS

Asteroid impact.
Instant vaporization of the
asteroid and surrounding rock.



1 MINUTE

Shock waves race around
the planet. A crater over
120 miles wide begins forming.



5 MINUTES

Tsunami surges through the
Gulf of Mexico. Debris begins
falling back to Earth.



30 MINUTES

Wildfires ignite across
continents. The sky fills
with dust and debris.



1 HOUR

Darkness spreads. Temperatures
begin to drop. The collapse
of life on Earth has begun.

HOW SCIENTISTS SOLVED THE MYSTERY

For decades, the extinction puzzled researchers. Then, piece by piece, the evidence came together.



IRIDIUM LAYER

A thin layer rich in iridium found worldwide.



SHOCKED QUARTZ

Crystals deformed only under extreme pressure.



GLASS SPHERULES

Tiny droplets of melted rock that cooled in midair.



TSUNAMI DEPOSITS

Sand and debris laid down by giant waves around the world.



CHICXULUB CRATER

A 120-mile-wide impact crater buried beneath the Yucatán Peninsula.



RADIOMETRIC DATING

The impact and extinction occurred at the same moment in time.

Eating of *DESTINY* is well underway.

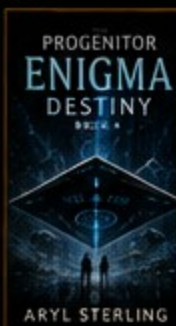
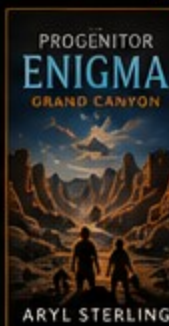
